A letter from our Minister

Dear Friends,

For most of my life, I have had a well-developed tendency towards nostalgia – looking back on earlier days with affection. But maybe in my case this is not truly nostalgia, for many memories are tinged with sadness and regret, as well as pleasure.

From 1975 to 1984, I was the minister of Burley-in-Wharfedale Methodist Church. My wife, Julie, and I went to Burley just a year after our marriage, and both our children were born while we were there. In many ways, it was an extremely happy time – ministering in a lively and growing church, working in amicable ecumenical partnership with other local churches, being part of a strong and supportive Circuit team. I have so many memories to cherish of those years.

Shortly before our departure in 1984, a morning service was broadcast live from Burley on ITV. Twenty-five years later, in October 2009, the church decided to show a video recording that had been made of that service, and to invite us to tea first! It was in many ways a lovely occasion – meeting old friends, catching up on news, sharing memories, rejoicing in the new developments that have taken place within that church and its community.

But it was not without sadness. Inevitably, the video film included shots of many, many people who had since died – some within months of the broadcast service; one only a few days before the 2009 service. And the occasion was not without embarrassment; seeing myself as I was a quarter of a century ago and having to listen to this now unrecognisable person preaching a sermon was even worse than I had expected!

I guess that most of us find that our memories are mixed, and that exercises in nostalgia often result in the recalling of events or conversations or experiences that are not uniformly heart-warming.

There is a sense in which the Universal Church constantly engages in nostalgia, a rehearsal of memories; and here too there is joy mingled with sadness. The rehearsal of memories to which I have referred takes place in the regular, repeated recalling of God's mighty acts in creation and redemption, and especially in the life and death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. The Church's memory includes the joy of Christmas and Easter, but also the sadness and anguish of Gethsemane and Calvary. It is a sign of the complexity of the Church's memory that we refer to the day when Jesus was crucified as 'Good' Friday.

Sometimes, in our private lives and in our deepest relationships, we need what some people call 'the healing of memories'. But, in the providence of God, it is often in the recalling of his great and wonderful deeds – in our sharing in the Church's act of remembrance – that we receive healing and wholeness.

BRITISH METHODISTS SUPPORT DISASTER VICTIMS IN INDONESIA, SAMOA AND TONGA

An appeal for prayer and funds for victims of the tsunami and earthquake tragedies has been launched by the Methodist Church in Britain.



SAMOA

In 5 minutes, the tsunami claimed at least 140 lives in Samoa, many of them children. One couple lost all four of their children and there are eight babies being cared for in the local hospital who are motherless. With many people losing multiple members of their families, their support networks in times of grief and crisis have also been shattered as everyone on such a small island is connected in some way.

Five Methodist churches in the area were destroyed. Ministers, their families and many of their congregations are not only homeless, but churchless too. However, this did not stop them having worship in their tents on the first Sunday after the disaster struck.

The main concern now is the health of those who have survived. Because they are camping out, clean water and sanitary issues are major problems and the health services are preparing for illnesses and diseases that will follow. The priority is to try and build some temporary homes along with sanitary facilities.

The Samoan Church has specifically asked us to help them rebuild their churches and homes for their ministers.

Steve Pearce, partnership coordinator for Asia and the Pacific, said, "It is clear that the Church will be heavily involved in the recovery both spiritually and pastorally in the weeks to come."



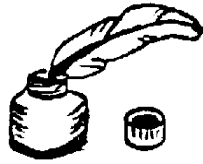
TONGA

A state of emergency was declared in Tonga for Niuatoputapu, the closest island to Samoa with a population of around 1,000 people. The islanders of Niuatoputapu have been badly hit by the tsunamis and earthquakes which have rocked the area. Food, clothing and kitchen utensils have been sent and the general secretary of the Free Wesleyan Church in Tonga has travelled to the area to make an assessment of the situation.

INDONESIA

In Indonesia, the main centre of the earthquake damage has been in Padang on the island of Sumatra. Shocks were felt over a great distance and the damage and loss of life has been frightening.

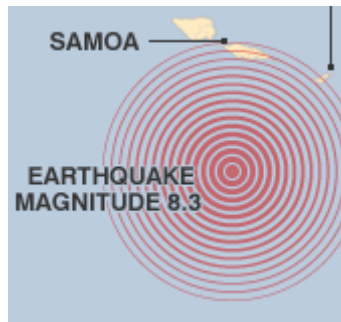

Steve continued, "We have heard news that the only Methodist church in Padang is completely destroyed. The cost of rebuilding is at least £14,000. Can British Methodist Churches raise this? We have sent an initial solidarity grant and will respond further to our Partner Church as their need becomes clearer. I have assured the church and its members of our prayers and support." The Church's World Mission Fund has already sent £15,000 to aid the relief work of Partner Churches in the region.

She came from a C of E/Church of Nigeria background (but we don't hold that against her!), being actively involved in the cathedral in her home town, but was uncomfortable with the atmosphere in our cathedral (unlike in Nigeria they don't dance during services!) and started to look round to see what other churches had to offer.

The warm welcome given to her by Elvet 'smote her mightily'. People seemed to go out of their way to make her welcome (unlike in the Cathedral) and so she stayed with us. (And let's face it, her very open and loving nature made her extremely easy to love in return.)

For a long time, though, she was never completely sure of her overall reception among us and several times wondered what people might be thinking of 'that African woman' [her own choice of words, by the way: she may perhaps have already encountered that reaction elsewhere], especially when we asked her to read a lesson and take an active part in the prayers during one morning service. Afterwards, though, she was bowled over by the number of people coming up to her and saying how much they had enjoyed her contribution. She hadn't realised how many people knew her, but, as we pointed out, it wasn't difficult to explain as she was the only coloured person in the church and, at the same time, by far the most colourful – definitely 'unmissable'! And if she still had any lingering doubts then her last Sunday morning at Elvet and her last night at our housegroup next day certainly dispelled them, with people queuing up to wish her God speed, tell her with genuine sincerity how much they would miss her and to have their photo taken with her! Now she was definitely going to be 'missable'!

We (along with a goodly number of others) feel extremely sad now she has gone but very privileged to have been her adoptive parents here in Durham, having gained so much that has enriched our lives through getting to know her so well – but equally we feel extremely proud of Elvet for having taken her to its heart and making her one of us.

He continued in this voluntary post for another twelve years after Martin had left the Group! Although a lot of hard work was involved in these voluntary activities, Michael was happy doing things that would benefit others.

Elvet Church Project 2007-8: An update



Cambodian Street Children. Remember this - our most successful church project to date - helping to provide food and education for those unfortunate children whose families' only means of support meant the kids had to spend long dangerous hours sifting through the foul rubbish on the town rubbish dump outside Phnom Penh?

Prospects seemed good for the kids as a result of our aid, but there was always some uncertainty about the future of the Dump. This news, via the latest Global Care Newsletter, makes for sad reading.

CAMBODIA

It's a bleak time for our families at Stung Mean Chey as the dump has been closed down.

In the long term we hope this will prove to be good news, but in the short term our support is needed more than ever as most of these families have now lost their only source of income.

Their immediate future is very uncertain. A new dump has opened 15 km outside Phnom Penh, where the government insist rubbish pickers must be licensed; no-one is allowed to live on or near the dump; NGOs and foreign visitors are banned,

A handful of our families are applying for licences and commuting each day to the new site, but this action is out of the question for most families. Instead, they face a significant loss of income, and have few positive alternatives.

At this uncertain time the work of the New Hope Centre in educating these poverty-stricken children is more important than ever. All the children are still attending the centre regularly and staff are considering ways of developing new vocational training options which would help the families generate new income.

It is good to know that the New Hope Centre is still going strong. We hope and pray that it will continue for as long as it is needed.

John and Jeannette will keep us posted about any further developments, knowing that Elvet really took this project to heart.

ELVET COMMUNION STEWARDS

Communion collections at Elvet will go to the following charities this quarter.

JANUARY 2010 - Help the Aged - This is an international charity fighting to free older people from poverty, isolation and neglect. They support vulnerable older people in over 50 countries. Their mission is to work for disadvantaged older people. The group carries out research into their needs, campaigns for their rights, and provides vital services. In April 2009 Help the Aged joined with Age Concern to provide a national charity dedicated to improving the lives of older people.

FEBRUARY - Crisis - This is a national charity for single homeless people. There are many ways in which Crisis aims to help these people, eg, Crisis Skylight offers a variety of activities for homeless people and the general public; Crisis Christmas opens its doors in 7 centres across the UK over the Christmas period; the Crisis Supportive Housing model provides innovative solutions to homelessness while creating high quality, affordable homes for low-income essential workers, and formerly homeless adults; in addition to many other schemes. Crisis established its first Skylight Learning and Activity Centre outside London - in the North of England, at Newcastle upon Tyne.

The centre, in City House (City Road, NE1 2AF) opened its doors to members in April 2007. Crisis Skylight Newcastle combines free practical and creative workshops and more formal learning opportunities leading to qualifications and employment. Classes include art, singing, jewellery making, digital photography, pottery & ceramics, sculpture, car maintenance, acoustic guitar, IT & job skills.

MARCH - Action for Children - Action for Children supports and speaks out for the most vulnerable children and young people in the UK. They support families at critical times and with difficult problems. They help find carers for children who can't live with their families. They help vulnerable and excluded young people. They provide specialist help and support for disabled children and in their schools they help children and young people reach their full potential. In 2009 the society celebrated 140 years of helping the UK's most vulnerable children.

APOLOGY. In the last edition it was stated that the December collections would be for 'Riding for the Disabled', whereas this was in fact the charity that we collected for in October. The December collection was for 'Bibles in Braille'.
