## *A letter from our Minister*

*Dear Friends,*



Today I was at the Darlington District Synod. As part of our business we discussed a report which focuses on shaping the vision of this District of the Methodist Church for our future work; and the vision is a mission-focused one. The priorities of our District are seen in putting energy, resources, support and encouragement into mission orientated work, based in circuits and local churches. The sort of work which is concerned with developing fresh expressions of Church, standing alongside the weak and disadvantaged, work with young people and those at present outside the church, enabling people to participate in evangelism and making disciples, and looking for priorities of mission which are appropriate to churches specific contexts.

To discuss this report we split into groups, writing up our comments to be fed back into the consultation process. In the group I was in, this focus was seen both as an opportunity and as a threat. The opportunity, that there would be support both in terms of finance and personnel for those churches and circuits with vision and mission-shaped priorities of their own; the threat that churches and circuits without vision would be left to die. The reality was seen as being as stark as that. I must emphasise that these were comments from the group and not from the report. However, perhaps there is truth in this perceived harsh reality. The well known

proverb seems to be saying the same; 'Where there is no vision, the people perish'. (Proverbs 29:18)

We cannot afford to be churches and circuits without vision. In the twenty-first century we all need a vision for mission. So then, what is your vision for Elvet and Bowburn? What would you like to see Elvet and Bowburn doing and being in this generation? What fresh expressions of church might be possible here? How might we stand alongside the weak and disadvantaged? What work might we develop with our young people and with those outside the church, perhaps the couples who come to us for marriage? How might we be able to make disciples? And how might we discover the appropriate mission for our specific context?

I encourage you to ask yourself these questions, and share your thoughts with others, that between us we might discern God's vision and be encouraged to engage in Christ's mission, that God's kingdom may come and God's will be done, on earth, in our time and in our place, as it is in heaven.

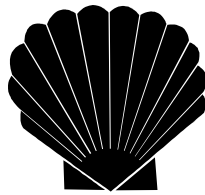

### **Elvet's Financial Stewardship Appeal**

The Treasurer was able to make an interim verbal report to Elvet's Annual Church Meeting in March, summarising progress with the financial stewardship appeal launched earlier in the year. A number of further replies have been received since that date, allowing us now to present a more complete picture of the outcome.

The letter accompanying the appeal explained the need for a substantial increase in congregational giving in order to address a growing deficit in our financial position. Having been fairly static through much of the earlier part of the decade, income from our members had started to fall in the last 3 years alongside the slow decline in membership numbers. Our costs, however, including both the circuit assessment and our local church expenses, were continuing to climb. These diverging trends had given rise to a projected deficit for 2007-2008 of around £7 000, with the shortfall forecast to widen at an increasing rate in subsequent years. If action was not taken to address the situation, the exhaustion of our reserves and eventual insolvency was becoming a foreseeable threat.

At the time the appeal was launched, 144 members of the congregation were known to be giving regularly to Elvet by weekly envelope, monthly standing order or other means. The total counts couples who are both members as two persons, even though they may be giving via a single, joint donation. Of these, 91 have now responded by returning the pledge form and/or making an increase in their giving. Thus, in one way or another, 63% of known givers have responded to the appeal. Some members who previously had preferred to remain anonymous have now joined one of the above schemes, so we now have 152 people known to be contributing, of which 56 give by weekly envelopes, 83 by monthly standing order and 13 by other means.

In the 2007-2008 tax year just ended, our income from known givers was a little over £47 000. We were able to claim gift aid tax on 92% of this, adding a further £12 000, and thus a total over £59 000. Looking at the new tax year, 2008-2009, and using the pledged or existing gift values, we can expect our income from giving to be about £57 000, with 96% of this being gift-aided. The addition of the gift aid tax should bring the total to over £72 000. This looks like an overall increase in the region of £13 000, but it is necessary to adjust this figure for a likely decrease of perhaps £1 500 in money placed on the plate by members who have now joined one of the tax-efficient schemes. As a result, the year-on-year increase from 2007-2008 to 2008-2009 is expected to be in the region of £11 500.

With this increase in pledged congregational income the outlook for our financial situation is substantially improved. Provided we receive no surprises in other areas – and in making projections that is always an important proviso – we can reasonably expect that Elvet will be able to preserve a balance to its overall income and expenditure across the period of the next 3 financial years. This is a welcome and encouraging outcome, and we can take considerable heart from the continuing support this offers to the life and witness of both this church and our circuit.

The final effect was quite impressive and after receiving much encouragement from the local community, the display has been repeated each year since.

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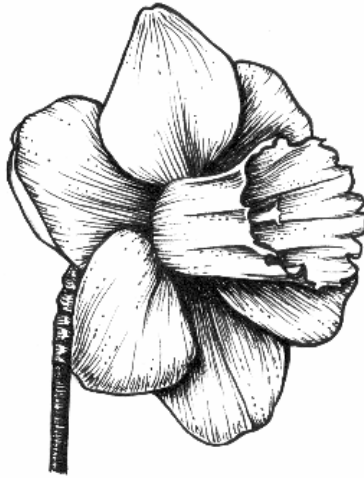
**LISTEN TO THE LATEST METHODIST PODCAST**

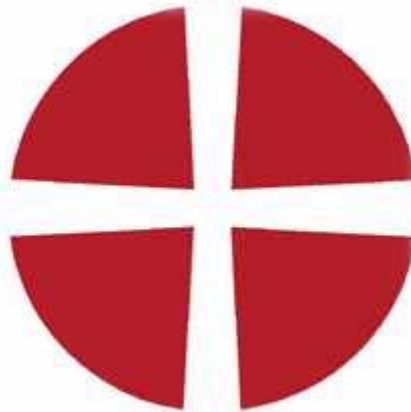

THE BIG EVENT FOR YOUNG PEOPLE AND LEADERS



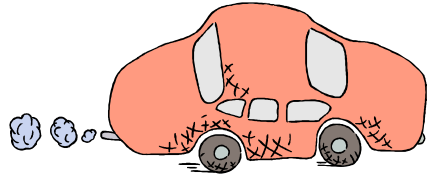

**From Sheffield South Circuit**

Inspired by a minister's experiences in Guatemala last year, a church in the Sheffield South Circuit organised a walk around the 11 churches of the circuit. Outside each church was an 'alfombra' - a picture made of flowers, sand, seeds or chalk - which congregation members had made that morning. A short act of worship took place when the walkers arrived at each church.

Three people and a dog walked the full route (which took 11 hours) and others joined in for smaller sections. Some used the occasion for outreach by giving out hot cross buns and details of what Good Friday is all about, one church invited children to help create an Easter garden and others opened their sanctuaries for prayer and meditation.

*It seems to me that this is like our very own well-dressing in Derbyshire. Have readers been to see this? Can I recommend it to those who are unfamiliar with the tradition? (Ed.)*

**From "A Comparative Newcomer"**

The author of this article has asked to remain anonymous.

I've been to Elvet Methodist a few times now, and thought you might perhaps be interested in the opinion of an outsider, a comparative newcomer.

Some churches strike you almost immediately as touchy-feely places, full of hugs and kisses. Elvet is not one of those. In fact, sometimes it seems emotionally slightly cold, a bit formal in an almost buttoned-down sort of way. I guess that's inevitable in such a huge, high building (a daunting place to preach in, surely?) and actually that's fine by me, since I'm not a happy-clappy sort of person.

What Elvet does well is organization. I doubt if Durham Cathedral, even, can say a year in advance who will be doing the flowers at any given service. I've never been in a church like it and I'm honestly, genuinely impressed. Is there a printing press in one of those rooms at the back? - a newsletter, yearbook, monthly information sheet, songbook and, every Sunday, a printed order of service. Remarkable.

An impressive range of activities too, it seems, though I've no idea how well supported they are: choir, Sunday school, Methsoc, charity work, weekday activities and, occasionally, early communion services and evening Taizé-style worship.

Now for the key question though, the one I always ask myself: would anyone really notice, if Elvet Methodist church just disappeared? What difference would that make? Not a lot of point to a church, I'd have thought, if it just exists for the comfort and reassurance of regular users.
